Welcome to our new cohort of Junior Doctors! While we know that our new starters have often been at other Trusts which also offer NHS library services, the services and resources each Trust offers differ

slightly and so do the routes to access them. For example, as a mental health and community trust we have more resources geared to specialist mental health topics than OUH (Oxford University Hospitals), who have more materials around acute care. We'll point our new Junior Doctors to resources such as MCQs and revision guides for the MRCPsych, as well as resources for patient care such as BMJ Best Practice or the Maudsley Prescribing Guidelines. We know that all our clinical staff are very busy people, so rather than make you go hunting for information yourself, we deliver an induction session to introduce new starters to the access points here at Oxford Health, the services we can offer to save you a bit of time, and introduce ourselves so you know who to get in touch with.

One of the things we mention in our induction is our training offer, which includes more in-depth sessions. For example, over this year we have delivered an advanced search session to support psychiatry SpRs with their

literature reviews and critical appraisal within journal club sessions.
