"When we think of Knowledge Management we tend to focus on the technology and forget the human aspect of it", said <u>Stephanie Barnes</u> in her *Radical Knowledge Management* presentation earlier in the year. Following this idea, I sometimes feel that when people think of libraries, they focus on printed books on shelves and forget the human aspect of



it. The focus of our work is to enabling connections between users and the information they require when they need it. This information sometimes comes from books, sometimes comes from other sources such as colleagues. Librarians are also knowledge managers. In November we will be focusing on raising awareness on how our library can help you to connect with the information you need.

In healthcare we require and use large amounts of information. No matter if you are in a clinical area or not. That can be overwhelming. Educated guesses are good, but tapping into colleagues' knowledge and searching for evidence can have a significant impact on patients care, recruitment and retention, and staff wellbeing. Our library service can help you not just to obtain books or journals. We can also help you to facilitate knowledge exchange using games, setting alerts on your area of expertise, receiving highly specialised bulletins and identify the right literature for a specific research question. Moreover, we have tools that facilitate the ability to connect with knowledge from your team or other teams. Our services are offered face to face and online.

By having a minute to stop, reflect and share our experiences, not just the ones related to the functioning of our work, we are creating mechanisms to manage the knowledge within our teams.

In this issue, you will find how we are improving our website to provide you with a much better experience when connecting with the information you need.
