Primary Care Newsflash

I started in post as Primary Care Knowledge Specialist in February and hit the ground running. I have completed all mandatory Oxford Health Training including the Corporate Induction and also the HEE Health Mobilisation Tool training, ORKA (OHFT repository and showcase) and Expert Search Training on the native interfaces, among others. This has given me the confidence

to undertake Literature Reviews for Clinical Pharmacists, Occupational Therapists and Dentists on topics as diverse as Protocols for Stroke Rehabilitation and Complex Partial Seizures.

I have delivered 1:1 training sessions which have given confidence to practitioners in using OHFT Electronic Resources and finding evidence to directly support patient care. I have been surprised at the range of professionals working on the front-line in Primary Care: from Pharmacists to Health Visitors, Physical Therapists to Dentists, GPs and nurses.

One of the most exciting aspects of my job has been networking with my Primary Care colleagues: the HEE Primary Care Knowledge & Library Community of Practice, Oxfordshire Training HUB, Thames Valley GP Training School and the Frimley Park CCG Group.

I am looking forward to becoming embedded in Primary Care provision within Oxfordshire to being the first port of call of information to support evidence-based practice and improve patient care within Oxfordshire. I hope to get out and meet as many of you as possible.

The Oxford Health Online Repository.

ORKA stands for Oxford Health Research and Knowledge Archive. It is an online repository for Oxford Health research: we store research done by staff at Oxford Health.



You can find it in <https://oxfordhealth-nhs.archive.knowledgearc.net/>.

ORKA provides a snapshot of the research done by Trust staff and as it is publicly available on the internet. This facilitates promoting the work done in the Trust more widely. We can also use ORKA to find other insights: in recent years we have used it to give an idea of the number of articles published with NIHR funding from the NIHR bodies hosted at Oxford Health, such as the BRC and CRF (we collected around 138 in 2021-22). Or you can browse by topic, such as 'Eating Disorders' to see which Trust staff have published research in this area, for example.

A lot of what we collect is articles published in journals, but we also collect unpublished research such as conference posters and ward projects undertaken for L&D courses. The unpublished research is particularly valuable, as this can otherwise be very hard to find! (If you have presented at a conference recently and would like to submit your presentation or poster we would be delighted to receive it. Email us at library.enquiries@oxfordhealth.nhs.uk.)

We aren't always able to provide the full text of an article on ORKA; this depends on the copyright permissions from the journal. If it is an open access paper we will have the full text, otherwise there will be a link to the journal. You can access many of these full text articles using your OpenAthens account! And if you can't access it, you can always request the article from the library.

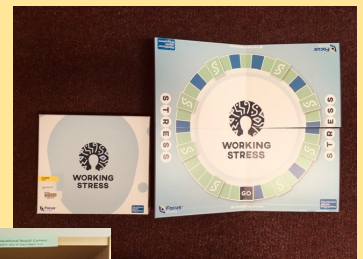


Focus Games, serious learning made fun
